Domestic Violence Act, Chapter 45:56 as amended by the Domestic Violence (Amendment) Act, 2020 applies to all citizens regardless of whether the incident occurred publicly or privately.

Violence Concept — Public Scope

The Domestic Violence Act, Chapter 45:56 defined "domestic violence" as including physical, sexual, emotional or psychological or financial abuse committed by a person against a spouse, child, any other person who is a member of the household or dependant. The Domestic Violence (Amendment) Act, 2020 widened the scope of relationships covered, now including "dating relationship" and "domestic relationship" per Section 3(b).

Section 3 - "Interpretation" - "domestic violence" includes physical, sexual, emotional or psychological or financial abuse committed by a person against a spouse, child, any other person who is a member of the household or dependant; "domestic relationship" means the relationship between a respondent and a person, where the person— (a) is, in relation to the respondent; (i) a spouse or former spouse; (ii) a cohabitant or former cohabitant; (iii) a child; (iv) a dependant; (v) a relative; (vi) a person who has agreed to marry the respondent whether or not that agreement has been terminated; (b) is or was, in relation to the respondent— (i) a person in a visiting relationship; or (ii) a person in a dating relationship; (c) would be a relative of the respondent, related by marriage, if the respondent and a person referred to in paragraph (a)(ii) were married to each other; (d) is a member of the same household as the respondent or the applicant; (e) has a child in common with the respondent; or (f) is an adult in a residential institution and the respondent is— (i) an owner or, a manager or employee of the institution; or (ii) a volunteer or a person engaged in employment at the Institution. "Emotional or Psychological abuse" means a pattern of behaviour of any kind, the purpose of which is to undermine the emotional or mental well-being of a person including — (a) persistent intimidation by the use of abusive or threatening language; (b) persistent following of the person from place to place; (c) depriving that person of the use of his property; (d) the watching or besetting of the place where the person resides, works, carries on business or happens to be; (e) interfering with or damaging the property of the person; (f) the forced confinement of the person; (g) persistent telephoning of the person at the person's place of residence or work; and (h) making unwelcome and repeated or intimidatory contact with a child or elderly relative of the person. "Financial abuse" means a pattern of behaviour of a kind, the purpose of which is to exercise coercive control over, or exploit or limit a person's access to financial resources so as to ensure financial dependence. "Physical abuse" means any act or omission which causes physical injury and includes the commission of or an attempt to commit any of the offences listed in the First Schedule. "Sexual abuse" includes sexual contact of any kind that is coerced by force or threat of force and the commission of or an attempt to commit any of the offences listed under the Sexual Offences Act in the First Schedule.

(2) An emergency application under subsection (1) may be made by telephone, video conference or other appropriate electronic means. (3) Where a Judge or Master of the Family Court or Children Court is satisfied that the urgency of the circumstances referred to in subsection (1) so requires, he may— (a) dispense with the requirement for an application for a Protection Order under section 10(1) and proceed to hear the emergency application; and (b) grant an Interim Order in accordance with section 8. (4) Where a Judge or Master grants an Interim Order under sub-section (3), he shall order the police officer to cause— (a) the application for the Protection Order to be filed in such Court as the Judge or Master may direct, in a period of within forty-eight hours of the making of the Interim Order or on the date of the next sitting of the Court after the expiration of that period; and (b) the Interim Order be served on the respondent, forthwith. (5) The Court referred to in sub-section (4) shall summon the applicant and the respondent to appear for the hearing of the matter as soon as possible after the filing of the application for the Protection Order."
